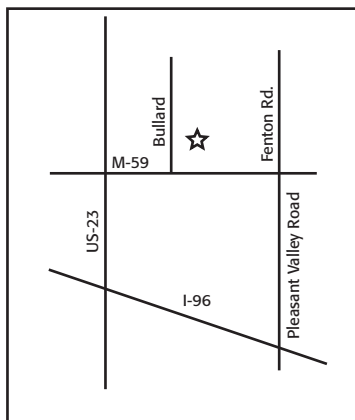

Inclement Weather Delay Notice

1 HOUR DELAY

All students will ride the same bus with the same type of pick-up structure as under normal circumstances other than that bus will arrive at the regular pick-up stop approximately one hour later than usual. No structure changes will exist other than the time element. Under a one-hour delay, morning junior kindergarten classes will be held. There will be no vocational education classes.

2 HOUR DELAY

Under a two-hour delay, all students will be picked up as usual, except two hours later than on a regular schedule. Under a two-hour delay, there will be NO A.M. JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN. There will be no vocational education classes.

The purpose of this alternative plan is to enable me the flexibility of delaying school on some mornings due to fog and/or freezing rain. I am hoping that it will help assure that more instructional days can be held, while improving the safety factor for our staff and students.

Under a delay approach, all staff should report prior to the arrival of their students. Below you will find a chart outlining regular starting times and the starting times under a one and two hour delay situation. The chart also shows the time lunch schedules would begin. You will note that no alteration is being made regarding lunch. This will enable all personnel to function as usual. If you have any questions, please contact me.

type of malfunction or symptom; the student diagnoses and repairs the problem and sends the vehicle back on the road as good as new. Wow, powerful, memorable, and confidence building.”

Why are you still here?

“This is the most commonly asked question I hear, right after ‘can you fix my car?’ Former Superintendent Pete Caroselli pointed out to me many years ago and on more than one occasion that I had the best job of anyone he knew. You could never fool Pete. He was right at that time, and as far as I’m concerned that’s still true after 33 years. My job keeps me here because I enjoy the daily interaction with the students, the staff/employees, and community.”

“Someday I’ll follow through with the threat that I’ve made to my students for years – ‘when I retire you can hire me to sweep the floor in your repair shop.’ And it looks like I’ll have a busy retirement because I’m proud to say that many a Hartland automotive student is an automotive repair facility owner and operator.”

Positive thoughts about Hartland schools:

“When I graduated from college with my shiny new diploma, I interviewed in half a dozen Michigan schools to teach Automotive Technology. The teaching market wasn’t as competitive as it is today and applicants had more options for employment. When I interviewed in Hartland I immediately knew that this was the place I wanted to work. Meeting the staff/employees, students, and community gave me an insight into the tradition and harmony of a vibrant community. A perfect example of this tradition is reflected in the number of employees/staff that are Hartland alumni.”

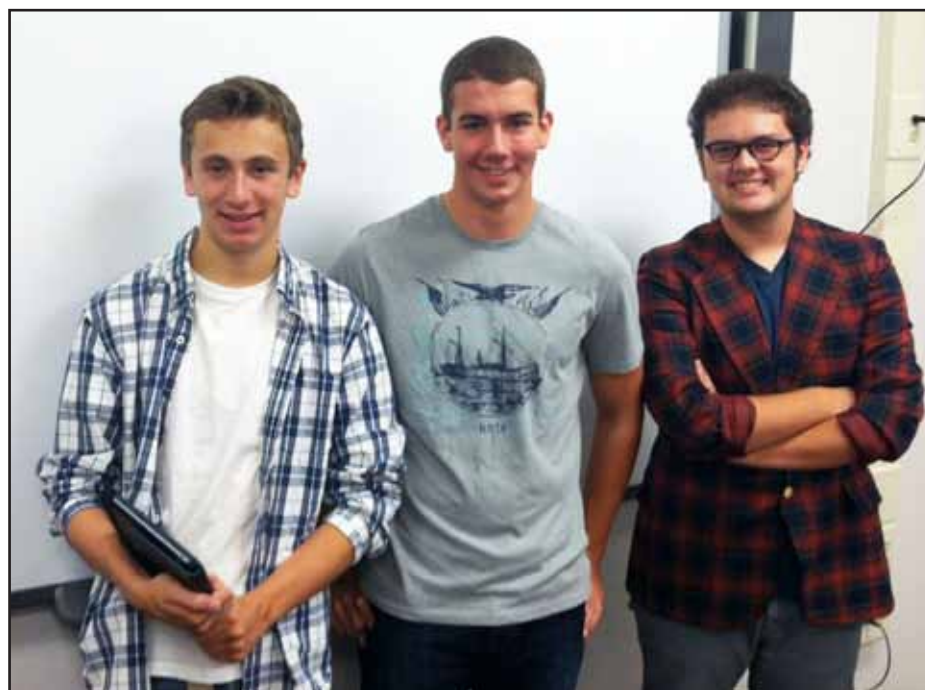

Student TECH Crew

With the addition of so many new technology upgrades throughout our school, it has been very challenging to keep up with training and implementation issues for staff. The HCS Technology Department has done an outstanding job holding trainings, helping staff get acclimated to the technology, and also addressing concerns. However, with a major implementation like the one we had this summer, on-site technology help is extremely helpful.

To meet this need, HHS has developed a program called Technology Education Committee at Hartland (TECH). TECH utilizes technology savvy students to help train teachers how to use technology in a meaningful way. The new TECH Crew is made up of three members, Eric Schwartz, Jacob Scherba, and John Moraitis who were recommended by their teachers for their knowledge using technology as well as their ability to take on responsibility and work in a professional setting. These three students will be busy helping teachers understand software applications, integrate technology into their classroom lessons (iPads and SMART Boards), utilize their email and calendar capabilities, and other miscellaneous technology issues. Hartland FCCLA returns from Orlando with 10 medals

More than 6,800 nationwide members, advisers alumni, and guests of Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA), gathered in Orlando, Florida, July 8-12 for the 2012 National Leadership Conference. Our very own Hartland High School in was among them.

This year's student-originated theme for the annual national meeting was "#realitycheck." Throughout the five-day convention, participants examined and discussed several critical issues, including family, school and community violence prevention, physical as well as financial fitness, future career exploration and countless community service projects. A number of relevant youth issues, such as the changing roles of men and women in the home and workplace leadership, and obesity prevention were also explored at the meeting through presentations, workshops, and youth sessions. Hartland had ten participants presenting their community service project and brought home 3 golds, 3 silvers, and 4 bronzes.

A donation of \$37,488.71 was presented to Share Our Strength from National FCCLA to fight childhood hunger. In addition, over 15,000 pairs of shoes were collected to benefit Soles4Souls. One of the great presenters was Dennis Trittin, who wrote a book called "What I Wish I Knew at 18".

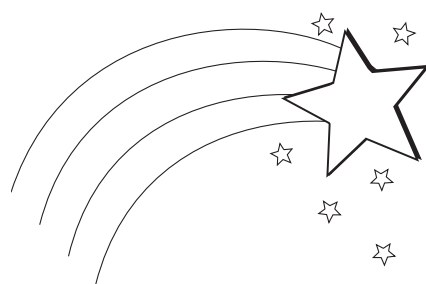

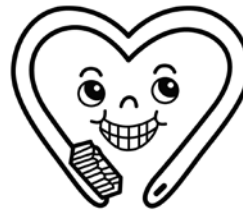
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Who Was Supposed To Be Watching Grandma?

There is a popular tune played this time of year called "Grandma Got Run Over by A Reindeer" which relates that Grandma -- after drinking too much eggnog -- went out into the winter cold to get her medication and was run over by a reindeer. The question is, "Who was supposed to be watching Grandma?"

Though this little tune is just for fun, it may very well raise alarms to many care-givers of the elderly. Caregivers know that even at a holiday party they cannot let down their diligent watch over their elderly loved one. As far-fetched as it may sound, with all the people and noise, an elderly family member with dementia or Alzheimer's may be enjoying the family gathering and then suddenly become con-fused and walk to the door and leave.

For family caregivers the added stress of the holidays with decorating, shopping, parties and keeping up with all the family traditions is an overwhelming quest. Feelings of isolation, depression and sadness come with this added stress. There are millions of Americans who are caring for elderly frail loved ones and most of these caregivers will go through some of these emotions, especially this time of year.

There are some things you can do as a caregiver to help you and those you care for enjoy

the holiday season.

First take care of yourself. Try to eat right, get plenty of sleep and exercise. This will help reduce stress and strengthen your ability to cope with caregiving responsibilities.

Prioritize your holiday traditions. Perhaps instead of cooking a large family dinner, have everyone bring his or her favorite dish. Use paper plates. Forfeit the traditional outside light decorating for a lighted wreath on the front door. Choose one or two parties or concerts to attend instead of trying to do it all.

Arrange for help. Call on other family members to help with the caregiving while you do your shopping or go out for the evening. If family is not available, ask your church group or a neighbor if they would donate a few hours.

Use community services. Many senior centers provide meals for the elderly and supervised activities, onsite, at no charge or a minimal charge. For locating senior services in your state, call your state Area Agency on Aging or check the national locator website at <http://www.n4a.org/>

Use adult day care services. Some assisted living facilities provide day activities and meals for seniors on a day by day basis. Other organizations called "adult day service providers" specialize exclusively in this sort of care support

at a reasonable cost. These support services provide respite for caregivers from their caregiving responsibilities as well as social interaction for their elderly family members. There is a cost for adult day services, but the benefit for all is worth it.

Technology to the rescue. Here is a solution that would have kept "Grandma" from going out in the winter cold and getting run over by a reindeer. Companies that have created monitoring systems, security alarms and other safety equipment are "tweaking" them to adapt to the needs of seniors and their care givers.

Here are a few examples:

- Ankle or wrist bands that monitor location and alert the provider when a person has gone beyond the designated perimeter, such as out the front door of the house.
- Motion detectors. Set throughout the home, motion detectors allow someone outside the home to follow a senior as he or she moves through the house.
- Smart medication dispensers. Live monitoring and dispensing of pills.
- Emergency response alert. At a touch of a button on a desktop monitor, bracelet or necklace, emergency help is summoned.

Whether providing care in your home or helping senior family members in their own homes, your use of monitoring and "tech" help aids can provide extra safety for your loved ones, and peace of mind for you.

You are not alone. Join a caregiving help group. Your local senior center may have one or go on the internet to find one. Hearing about other caregivers' problems and solutions and being able to share your own and ask questions is a great way to relieve stress and gain a new perspective.

Work with a Senior Care Professional. Recognize that you are doing the very best you know how. You are not a geriatric health care practitioner, geriatric care manager, home care nurse or aide, hospice provider or family mediation counselor, nor do you have the years of training and experience these professionals have, but you can definitely use their experience. In fact, using a senior care specialist will make caregiving easier for you and more beneficial for your elderly family member.

One more thing to remember. As a family caregiver, the greatest gift you are giving this holiday season is "Love."

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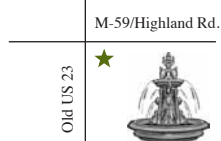
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Hartland United FC attend preseason tournaments

Nine Hartland United Football Club Select and Premier Travel soccer teams began their preseason play by participating in at least one tournament. All teams demonstrated teamwork, perseverance and played technically strong and many of the teams placed in the top 3 or became the tournament champions.

The U14 girl's team coached by Shaun Murphy began the tournament season by bringing home the Northville Rush tournament trophy on August 10-12.

Hartland's newest boys travel team at the U10 age group played in the Powerade tournament in Brighton, MI. A young group of boys played tough and despite losses (0-4) Coach Joe Leone was able to use these games as feedback to address the technical and tactical needs of his players in the coming season.

On August 24-26, Hartland's soccer program had the largest number of teams attend (6 girls and 1 boy) the Fusion Invitational Tournament in Midland, MI. The U11G Gold (Coaches Toor/Binkiewicz), U13 G Gold (Binkiewicz/Swann/Grattan) placed 3rd and the U12G Gold (Javit/Javit) placed 4th. Coaches Dennis Kastamo and Cory Swann's U9G Blue team became tournament champions in their age group for a second consecutive year.
